John Bothamley

John's background is in the building trade. With a lifelong interest in construction, both as a building developer and, since qualifying in 1990 in architecture, has worked both as a designer for many building projects, and as a developer of interesting buildings. Projects have ranged from new houses,



hostels and hotels to masterplans. Since 1995 he has run Four Acre Trust, a grant making charitable trust, supporting children's charities that help to give children a better start in life; a major project supported is the Talk the Talk programme which trains young people to be confident communicators for life.

He is chairman of Hereford Civic Society, which for over forty years has worked to promote interest in our built environment. The objects are

- To promote high standards of planning and architecture in or affecting Hereford.
- To educate the public in the geography, history, natural history and architecture of Hereford and give related advice and information.
